Colleen McRoberts is the Iowa Annual Conference's Leadership Development Minister (LDM) for Social Justice & Mission. Here's a portion of an article she wrote in the midst of Advent. It was addressed to church leaders, but it seems to have truth for each of us as we cast the lines into a new year:

I had lunch with a small group and the topic was wellness. What does it look like? How do healthy people, couples, families, churches, communities, and institutions maintain balance? What do they hold on to? How do they let go?

People are suffering from too many hours on the clock, not enough friends to rely on, and an almost pathological inability to say "no" even when schedules are full. We are not eating well, sleeping enough or choosing to believe the best of one another. We have forgotten how to spend time with ourselves. We have forgotten how to experience Sabbath. We have forgotten what it is to play.

And our life in Christ becomes a stone we are pushing up a hill alone.

In John 10: 10b Jesus says, "I came so that they could have life – indeed so that they could live life to the fullest."

Colleen's comments reminded me of the four questions of our Fall Stewardship campaign.

What one thing do you desire from God? What one thing do you lack? What one thing do you need to let go? What one promise do you need to claim?

That campaign was about much more than just finances. "Stewardship" is the care we take to live intentionally to our fullest potential in all areas of our life. May this new year hold all the blessings of whole-life stewardship!

Growth & Impact Groups (GIGs) are one of the ways the church has, historically, helped people live deep and wide. In his journal, John Wesley wrote:

In the latter end of the year 1739, 8 or 10 persons came to me, who appeared to be deeply convinced of sin, and earnestly groaning for redemption... This was the rise of the United Society... Such a Society is no other than a company of [people] having the form and seeking the power of godliness, united in order to pray together, to receive the word of exhortation, and to watch over one another in love, that they may help each other to work out their salvation.

These "Societies," or small groups, became the base camp for the growth and spread of deepening discipleship that came to be known as Methodism. These United Societies were then divided into classes of up to 12 people which were composed of even smaller groups called Bands. So, you see, we have not created GIGs, but happened on GIGs as a way to return to the vital spiritual roots of the Methodist tradition.

GIGs are not classes, in which a specified amount of information is dispensed and, when it has been, the class is "done." No, learning trust, growing in prayer, becoming formed in Christ are not so simple as to lend themselves to semesters or terms.

On behalf of the Missions Team, we THANK YOU for the generous giving of your time and monetary donations to Missions projects throughout the year. We couldn't do all that we do year after year without your support and priorities you place on being a "missional" church. Projects have included a week-long trip to the Project Crossroads in Marion, VA, Make A Difference Community Work Day, Fat Tuesday pancakes, Easter breakfast, Rummage and Recycle Sale, Shared Blessings Community Meals, Food Pantry, Angel Tree, Thanksgiving Ingathering, World Communion Soup Lunch, Alternative Gift Market, and Mission Produce Market. Any funds raised from these projects and our special offerings (i.e. copper kettle, Easter Pool, Christmas) go to support a wide-variety of Mission projects. A complete report of your 2013 mission giving will be available in January.

Missions Up-date

We received \$581 for the Thanksgiving offering. A portion of the funds will be used to purchase the remaining gifts for the "Angel Tree" family and the rest of the funds will be added to the benevolence fund. The benevolence fund is used to individuals or families needing assistance.

We collected a total of \$870.44 to go to UMCOR disaster relief efforts in the Philippines.

Shared Blessings Meals

THANK YOU to all who helped with Shared Blessings in 2013. We appreciate your help and hope you experienced the blessing of serving others in our

community. It's our prayer that "community" happens both in the dining area **and** the kitchen!

January will begin the 5th year! It seems the history confirms the importance of offering the free meals and warm fellowship to fellow community members. The meals will continue to be served from 11:00 a.m. to Noon on the second, fourth, and fifth Saturdays each month. With only one meal left (as of this writing), we've offered 26 meals serving an average of 56 meals each time. We've had 270 total volunteers and a total of 1,449 meals served so far this year.

Our goal is to involve more people in the Shared Blessings program in 2014. The 2014 calendar is ready to go and sign-up sheets are located in the Fellowship Room. Please consider volunteering – it's a great way to meet new friends or invite a group of friends, committee/SS class/UMW Circle/GIG or another small group sign up for a meal or two.

Many volunteer opportunities are available. If you are interested in helping cook or with meal preparation, sign up for the early (9:00-11:00) shift. If you are interested in serving, clean-up, and interacting with those who come to Shared Blessings, sign up for the late (11:00-1:00) shift. We also need people to drive the bus, deliver meals to "homebound" folks, serve as "hosts" when we have outside groups serving the meals, and provide "hospitality or friendship" by simply eating and talking with our guests. For some reason, their folks have not picked up on the opportunity to make a difference in their community and the world. I do not gloat, in fact, I pray for churches [and pastors of those churches!] who are unable (or unwilling??) to "do the chores." Your faithfulness makes it possible for the leadership of your church, both volunteers in ministry and paid ministry staff, to use more energy and prayer on what Jesus is calling us to do! In that, may Jesus be praised.

Lay Servanthood Ministries

YOUR Apportionments at Work for Christ's Sake !!

With only 61 members on its rolls at last count, the Lebanon United Methodist Church in southeast Iowa's Van Buren County has 3 Lay Servants who provide leadership within and beyond the congregation.

All have received training through the Iowa Conference Board of Laity's Lay Servanthood Ministries. Yet, each has chosen a different form of service based on the particular ways that God has blessed them with gifts for ministry.

Joyce Burdett is a Certified Lay Servant, who recently completed a class that focused on care for aging adults. Averaging 2 visits to the nursing home each week, she found the information from the class very helpful. "New ideas are still spinning in my head," she remarked as she considered ways to apply her learning to her ministry.

Joyce's husband, Sanford, just completed the basic Lay Servant course. This class provides an introduction to the ways that lay people serve in ministries most suited to their abilities and interests. He is already very active along with Joyce serving the needs of homeless persons in their area. He looks forward to new possibilities that God may place before him as a result of his training.

Kenneth Wells has been active for years with as Work Project Coordinator for Mobile United Methodist Missionaries (MUMMS). He has led work teams throughout the state of Iowa and beyond to respond to natural disasters from tornadoes to floods. He enrolled in Lay Servant classes "to feel more comfortable talking about missions" with local churches.

Lay Servant ministries provide one avenue for developing leaders in the United Methodist Church. Apportionments help to support curriculum development as well as to underwrite the costs for the classes, which are coordinated by each district in the Iowa Conference.

Meet a Methodist

Meet Iowa Conference Bishop Julius C.

Trimble. He was born in Chicago, Illinois. He is the fourth of six children born to John Trimble (deceased) and Marybelle Pryor Trimble, both of Montgomery, Alabama. He married Racelder Grandberry Trimble in 1979, and they have three children Cameron Calvin, Candiace Racelder, Julius Thomas. He started his ministry as a youth pastor in Chicago in 1980. In 2008 he became the bishop of the Iowa United Methodist Conference. Julius was a delegate to General and Jurisdictional Conferences in 2000, 2004 and 2008. He was elected Bishop by the North Central Jurisdictional

Conference in Grand Rapids, MI in 2008 and assigned to serve the Iowa Area.

Currently, Julius serves as a member of the United Methodist Immigration Task Force and as chairperson of the Africana Hymnal Study Committee authorized by the 2008 General Conference.

Recipient of many honors and awards, Bishop Trimble remains a Life Trustee of the St. Luke's Foundation of Cleveland. He received the Outstanding Alumni Award in 1998 from Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary and the 2007 Bishop James S. Thomas Social Action Award from the Methodist Federation for Social Action at Lakeside, OH. He continues to promote faith-based response to domestic violence and has encouraged the establishment of mental health ministries at the local church and conference level.

Faith-Full Living Nurturing Faith 24/7

In the church, we talk about "growing in Christ", "faith development", "growing spiritually"... But, how do we do that? For the next few months, we will be offering ideas, activities, and resources that can help people grow spiritually and feel more connected to the faith community. Most of these creative ideas will come from the book, <u>Nurturing Faith in Families</u>.

1. Create a calendar or date book that includes the birthdays and anniversaries of family members and friends. Besides sending a card or calling to give a birthday or anniversary greeting, also pray for that person or couple on those days.

2. Make a habit of praying together as a family. Good times would be at mealtimes or bedtime. One way to pray is to have the parent start the prayer, then each family member adds a word or two. For example, say a thank-you prayer, such as "Thank you God for..." Each family member then adds one word, such as food, bunnies, friends, soccer, or grandparents. Or say a prayer of confession, such as "God, I'm sorry that..." Each family member then adds something such as "I yelled." "I got mad at the dog." "I didn't make my bed."

Spend time with your family going through clothing, household items, or toys no longer being used. Decide which items you'd like to donate to the church rummage sale being held this spring. Proceeds from the rummage sale are used to support mission projects.
