The **Healthy Church Initiative** has given me, and I hope you too, reason to consider <u>WHY</u>? <u>Why</u> should we be concerned about the health of a local congregation? <u>Why</u> would the world care about the health of a local church? <u>Why</u> does Tipton need the United Methodist Church? <u>Why</u> does God care about this little church in the Midwest? <u>Why</u> should we expend energy, emotion and time to make this church more fruitful?

In one of those moods when I was wondering if the preparation for the Consultation would be worth it, I received an email from a church coach. The author gave 6 reasons the Local Church is important:

**1.** A local church helped set the trajectory of my life. I decided to follow Jesus with my life at a local church. My best friends were members of that same church. I met my wife at that church.

**2. Jesus said, and told Peter, He would build His church.** There was a guy who was dead and came back to life. I'm going to hitch up to his construction crew and help build what He's building.

**3.** Churches come in all shapes and sizes. All of them are important and each of them matters. I know there is still work to do, but local congregations all over the world reflect heaven and their community at the same time.

4. The church is the closest representation of Jesus we have on earth. When a local church loves and serves their community, worships wholeheartedly, and gives generously, it's a very real picture of Jesus.

**5. Every church member is family.** They might be more like the crazy great Uncle, but it's family nevertheless.

6. Most pastors are selfless servants who want to make a difference. Most pastors are amazing, humble, selfless leaders who love Jesus and love their communities.

Maybe this gives you an opportunity to reflect on not only the blessings past but how is it God might desire to go through the Church, and Tipton 1<sup>st</sup> UM Church, to do a "new thing" today?!

There was a mother mouse who decided to teach her children about the world. So she gathered all of her little mice and set out for a walk. They walked down the hall and turned to the right. ## Missions

At our most recent meeting, the Missions team discussed the article, "Mission Engagement: Changes Congregations Are Facing Today" written by Lovett Weems, Jr. We liked his message and want to share highlights with you.

Clergy & laity often say mission engagement is where God is most alive and working in their congregations. However, their definition of "missions" is NOT the mission work done somewhere by others and paid for by congregations. Instead, they are thinking of churches for whom <u>local mission work</u> is far more developed and vital <u>and</u> they have a strong mission outreach with a significant global and national component.

Churches today are more likely to have a personal connection to much of their mission. Hands-on involvement is important.

Mission is seen not as what you do FOR the community but what you do WITH the community. Churches see themselves as part of the community. The goal of mission is an enhanced community where all have the chance to experience the abundant life God desires. This goal is achieved when missional efforts emphasize the importance of building relationships, not just performing tasks or writing checks.

Vital churches today are often partnering with other churches or organizations to serve their neighbors better.

There is growing evidence to suggest that younger adults are often first attracted to a church's mission activities. Mission brings people together across generational, denominational, racial, social and political groups.

To some extent the article affirms much of what 1<sup>st</sup> UMC-Tipton is attempting to do through projects such as our annual work trip, Shared Blessings, etc. But there is also the challenge for individuals of the church to do more to shape the community with the Spirit of Jesus. As the Missions Team continues to discern God's call, we encourage each of you to prayerfully consider what needs exist and how you might be more actively involved and intentional in developing relationships with our community and beyond.

## Nurturing Faith 24/7

Help your family to grow spiritually during the Lenten season by trying one of the following activities:

Make a "Lenten Giving Box". Any kind of container (i.e. shoebox, milk jug) will work. Place the container in a prominent place in your house. Have your family put loose change into it on a daily basis. Bring the container with you to worship on Easter Sunday.





Help to teach all family members the importance of giving.

Consider purchasing a flower bulb (such as an amaryllis, crocus, or hyacinth) at the beginning of Lent (March 5). Throughout the

Lenten season, the bulb will send out a shoot and usually will bloom toward the end of Lent. This symbolizes the new life coming.

#### Select an activity your family will "take on" dur-

ing the Lenten season. For example, your family could "adopt" someone who is living alone, homebound, living in the nursing home or not active in a church. Each week, your family

could do something for that person or family – visit them, draw pictures, bake treats, write notes, pray regularly for them, etc.

#### Spend time with your family going through cloth-



ing, household items, or toys no longer being used. Decide which items you'd like to donate to the church rummage sale being held in early May. Proceeds from the rummage sale will be used to support

mission work trips and local mission projects.

## First United Methodist Church ENDOWMENT FUND

1st UMC has a modest Endowment Fund, from which interest income is received annually. 2013 income amounted to \$421.35. That income is divided three ways:

**30% Missions:** people projects, local to international;

**30% Maintenance:** repairs, major improvements, special objects or furnishings;

**40% Ministries:** enhancements, education, communication, evangelism, worship

### The purpose of the Endowment is:

For charitable purposes of the church with its prime objectives being the promotion and development of religious, charitable and educational activities; and for non-recurring purposes NOT REGULARLY BUDGETED. (The caps are in the original document!)

#### The guidelines of the Endowment state:

"Needs in the above areas are ever present. Chairpersons of the committees... will submit their plans for the funding at the March Leadership Council (LC) meeting. The LC will approve all spending plans.... Funds may be accumulated if... it takes more than a year to plan and implement or it takes more than a year to raise enough funds to do the project."

It is preferred that requests come from a work area or committee of the church, but requests from individuals are also received and valued. The date of the March Leadership Council meeting is the 12th. After that date the next access to Endowment Funds is March 2015. Submit your requests, in writing, to Kathy Houstman, the pastor or the church office before 8:00 a.m. March 12!

## Leadership Council

According to <u>The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church 2012</u>, the purpose of the Leadership Council:

'Shall provide for planning and implementing a program of nurture, outreach, witness, and resources in the local church. It shall also provide for the administration of its organization and temporal life. It shall envision, plan, implement, and annually evaluate the mission and ministry of the church. The church council shall be amenable to and function as the administrative agency of the charge conference."

The agendas of 1<sup>st</sup> UMC-Tipton Leadership Council meetings give primary time and emphasis to the mission and ministries of the church. We're not sure what's the chicken and what's the egg, but we have not been 'forced' to spend a lot of time hand-wringing over which bills to pay first; or even which bills not to pay at all!! Thanks to every person who has, by giving of time and talents, freed this group to be vision-oriented!

This group is also expected to do periodic membership reviews. If our records say we have 457 members (last I heard) and we have an average worship attendance of 125 to 130, then what is our definition of "active member?" How might we do better at "making disciples" for Jesus Christ? Are we sending people into the community to make a difference? Are there areas of potential ministry that God may be expecting 1<sup>st</sup> UMC to be the hands and feet of Jesus on the street?

Leadership Council is a worshipping body. Every meeting includes worship, which serves to remind us whose work we do and who we need to seek to please.

It is also a learning group, spending some time in every meeting growing skills for the tasks God calls us. It is a goal that after serving a term on the Leadership Council that any person would be more confident of their faith and gifts for service in the church and beyond.

## **Family Ministry Opportunity**

A representative from Horizons of Cedar Rapids called a couple months ago. They have a program called "Survivors Program" that, among other things, provides hospitality for families involved in court cases involving a homicide. She asked if 1st UMC-Tipton would be the contact point for such a need if the Cedar County Courthouse would ever be the site of such a trial.

The way it operates is that we would prepare a meal, to be served either at the courthouse or the church [at the family's discretion.] Horizons covers the costs of ingredients. We do not have anyone present at the time of the meal. When the meal is done, we would come in a clean up.

Well, honestly, such a trial isn't the most common in Cedar County; and we're not really a venue to which a trial would be moved. So I said we would be; and if/when it came time to utilize such a service, we'd get the wheels under it at that time. If you have questions, let me know. Pastor Paul

## HEALTHY CHURCH INITIATIVE

One part of preparation for the Healthy Church Initiative Consultation is to hear from "neighbors" and community leaders. We will be informally surveying, asking such questions as:

What do you like about the Tipton community?

Can you name any needs or concerns about the community?

We are from 1st United Methodist Church of Tipton...

What might that church do to respond to the concern or need you've expressed?

What do you know about 1st United Methodist Church of Tipton?

Of community leaders, we may ask a question of this sort: What keeps you awake at night? It's possible that's all that would be needed to kick-start a conversation! Then we also want the persons who make these contacts to bring the information gleaned back to the church so a summary report can be created.

The Leadership Council would like all these interviews completed, and a report generated, by mid-March. if you would like to become part of this transforming work, contact the church office.

The consultation should be helpful for this or any church. But the experience of other people, lay and clergy, and other churches has shown over and over that the 'results' of the consultation aren't nearly as transforming as what happens in people as they participate in preparations and sessions; and personally experience the transformation within. Who we become in the process will or can be more important and spiritually rewarding than what we learn.



**LENT** is the season of 40 days [not counting Sundays] which begins on Ash Wednesday and end on Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the anglo-Saxon word, lencten, which means "spring." The season is a preparation for celebrating Easter. Historically, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by converts and then became a time for penance by all Christians. Sundays are always a celebration of Easter, so even during Lent Sundays are to be seasoned with the joyful expectation of the Resurrection. (UM Book of Worship # 320)

Yes, lent is a season to take seriously God's invitation to "Come, let us walk in the light of the Lord, that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths." (Isaiah 2:5, 3c) Therefore, it is a tradition of 1st UMC – Tipton to offer special opportunities to gather with one another to consider our current level and commitment to God through the *"great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus..."* 

(Hebrews 4:14)
