Here's a quote from the Leadership Institute hosted by the UM Church of the Resurrection, which Jane Moen, Melinda Stonebraker, Bob Young and Pastor Paul attended Oct. 1 & 2:

God created us to be in community. Dr. Gilbert Bilezikian, co-founder of the Willow Creek Community Church, has written:

"It is in small groups that people can get close enough to know each other, to care and share, to challenge and support, to confide and confess, to forgive and be forgiven, to laugh and weep together, to be accountable to each other, to watch over each other and to grow together. Personal growth does not happen in isolation. It is the result of interactive relationships. Small groups are God's gift to foster changes in character and spiritual growth."

Questions:

- Why do you think Jesus choose to be surrounded by a small group of people?
- What would Jesus' ministry have looked like without the apostles?

We might disagree on the prevalence of guns and the influence of the handsomely lucrative firearms industry. But unless I'm mistaken, we do not disagree that it is tragic and sad that so many residents young and old of the United States are subject to gun-related violence. The Children's Defense Fund sites these statistics:

- Guns remain the second leading cause of death among children and teens ages 1-19 and the number one cause among black children and teens.
- U.S. children and teens are 18 times more likely to die from a gun than their peers in 25 other high-income countries.
- A child or teen dies from a gun every 3 hours and 18 minutes.
- The risk of a child or teen dying from a gun now is 34% higher than in 1963, the earliest year of data available.

Gun death rates for children and teens in the U.S. were nearly four times higher than in Finland, the

country with the next highest rate, more than 14 times higher than in France, and over 67 times higher than in the United Kingdom.

The General Board of Church & Society of the UMC has put out a 3-session Bible study titled "Kingdom Dreams, Violent Realities: Reflections on Gun Violence from Micah 4:1-4." This Bible study is available from Pastor Paul or online at http://umc-gbcs.org/content/general/Kingdom-Dreams-Violent-Realities.pdf Bishop Robert Hoshibata writes in the Introduction:

"...discouraging are many of the discussions that swirl around the issue of gun violence. The use of tiresome clichés and unsubstantiated anecdotes robs us from genuine and thoughtful dialog and become a roadblock to achieving lasting peace. As faithful Christians we must approach the issue of gun violence through a theological and biblical lens. This study will help you do just that."

May we pray for peace... and then work for it!

Ten Things YOU Can Do to 'BRANCH OUT'

(brought to you by your HCI Hospitality Team!)

VISION STATEMENT: Our people will be Deeply Rooted, Branching Out, and Bearing Fruit.

1. Commit to faithful worship attendance yourself.

Your presence is important to your spiritual growth and the vitality of your church. Visitors who see a vibrant community with a critical mass of people will be more likely to return.

2. Follow up with people who are absent.

People like to know they are missed. Check in on friend, choir mates, or others who miss worship to make sure all is well. Even a quick Facebook post lets people know that their church friends care and that their presence matters.

3. Never judge people who drift away from the church.

They may be attending elsewhere, they may find it difficult to return after the death of a loved one, or they may have to work on Sundays. Whatever the reason, guilt trips are not helpful. Continue to love them and offer pressure-free invitations.

4. Personally invite others.

There's still nothing like a personal invitation to convince a friend, neighbor, or coworker to give your church a try. Special events like choir concerts, kids' events, or service projects may be easier entryways to church than Sunday worship.

5. Keep your worship program on hand.

Circle worship times or a specific calendar event, and pass it along to someone with a personal invitation to come. Offer to meet them beforehand so they won't have to arrive alone.

6. Keep your eyes peeled.

Be aware of people who look uneasy or lost and offer assistance. Watch for people in the parking area or sidewalk who could use a hand—a parent wrangling three kids and a diaper bag, or someone without an umbrella on a rainy day.

7. Put others before yourself.

Welcoming new people into the church can often mean getting outside our comfort zones. Be open to new people and new ways of doing things. Choose to value a new person's introduction to Christ more than your own preferences.

8. Adopt a newcomer.

Beyond just greeting new people, invite them to sit with you. Help them understand anything confusing in the worship service. Invite them to lunch after church and introduce them to others as you would a friend. Follow up with them later in the week with your hopes that they will come again.

9. Catch visitors before they leave.

It is estimated that guests leave the church building within three minutes of the service ending. Greet visitors after worship before speaking to family and friends.

10. Pray for people without a church home.

Ask God to open your eyes to people in need of a loving Christian community and to open doors for you to invite them. God can use you to change someone's life.

CHURCH CONFERENCE REFLECTIONS

For sure one of the highlights of the 2015 Church Conference, held Sunday, Oct. 18, was the approval of Jane Moen and Melinda Stonebraker as "Lay Servants." This position in the UMC, formerly "Lay Speakers," recognizes people who have taken some classes offered by the UMC and who have given evidence in their local church of ministry leadership. Wally Reidel was our most recent Lay Servant, it's now wonderful to have two! If you are curious or even interested, talk to one of the above named people or me for more information.

We also read the names of 13 people who have been removed from membership since the 2014 Conference. Nine of those were by death, four by transfer. We also celebrated the addition of 14 persons in that same time.

It was approved to [officially] accept the bequest of \$31,227.27 from the estate of Edie Ford. A second motion approved designation of funds: 10% toward children's ministries; 15% to various ministries in-process or to-be-identified (by Leadership Council); 25% to the 1st UMC endowment; and 50% toward Trustees' projects.

Of course, a major event in the annual Church Conference is identifying ways of moving forward the church's mission of "making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

The convener of the Church Conference was Pastor Heecheon Jeon, appointed July 1 to the Mt. Vernon UMC. It was our pleasure at the conclusion of the Conference to include in prayer Pastor Heecheon and his up-coming trip to his home-land of South Korea to observe his father's 80th birthday. It also gave all of us gathered an opportunity to think with a new heart and mind as this pastor from South Korea opened the Conference by reading from Matthew 28:19 & 20:

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."
