

One million books and a million hours of reading with children – that's the goal of Iowa United Methodists in the next year and a half in an initiative called, "Change a Child's Story".

The academic and economic futures of almost 90,000 young lowans are at risk.

- In 2012, roughly 1 in 4 lowa fourth-graders scored below a proficient level on the state reading test. Research indicates that a quarter of kids who are behind in reading by the 4th grade will eventually drop out of school, making them more likely to experience other hardships, including jail time.
- 55% of Iowa children under age six whose low-income parents don't have a high school diploma.
- 86% of children with parents who didn't graduate from high school live in low-income families.
- 61% of children in poverty don't have children's books at home.

Sadly, Iowa's kids are not all developing the reading skills they need for success.

Bishop Trimble is challenging every UMC church in Iowa to get involved in Change a Child's Story. **Our church has accepted the challenge to be a part of this exciting project!!**

Our church's goal is to donate 1,000 books and 500 hours of time reading to children by July 2017. A donation box for NEW and GENTLY USED books for children and youth is in the Gathering Place. We've already given books to the Little Friends Preschoolers at Christmas. Our next goal is to give books to Backpack Buddies before Spring Break.

Pick up an easy-to-complete, reading log to track your reading time. Reading to your kids and grandchildren can be included on your reading log, though you are encouraged to stretch yourself and find other kids in our community would benefit from having a reading buddy. (We'll allow you to include all the time you've read with kids since the beginning of the current school year— as you are able to remember!) We are in the process of developing a list of places volunteers are needed to read to kids or listen to the kids' read.

Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors



WHY SMALL GROUPS?? The item below is from 13 centuries ago, but it carries a message and a lesson for us, today...

St. Francis of Assisi (d. 1826) knew that he was greatly adored. He was tempted to believe the compliments so often given to him. It was heady stuff. But Francis found a way to handle such praise. When he felt his ego swelling from the adoration of the people, he would ask a fellow monk to sit down with him and tell him of faults he needed to work on.

Are we wiser or more discerning than St. Francis of Assisi? We'd each like to think so, but in fact, NO. We need people who are sufficiently loving to tell us when we err or when we have some area of personality, spirit or habit that needs to be hammered to more closely reflect the person of Christ.

LENT is a great time: 1) for GIGs and other groups to make invitations to those who are not yet actively growing their faith in the context of your class; 2) for individuals to jump into a GIG, class or group or to invite friends (or others without a group!) to form your own. The following prayer is by Archbishop Oscar Romero of El Salvador, written shortly before his 1980 assassination. So far this month it has stayed in front of my eyes, on my mind, and in my own prayers. Perhaps there will be a word, a line, a thought that helps you move forward, to do the next thing, even though you know it is beyond your scope to bring it to "completion."

"It helps now and then, to step back and take the long view. The kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision. We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work. Nothing we do is complete, which is another way of saying that the kingdom always lies beyond us.

"We plant the seeds that one day will grow; We lay foundations that will need further development.

"We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something, and to do it very well. It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning . . . an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest.

"We may never see the end results," Romero concluded, "but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker. We are workers, not master builders; ministers, not messiahs. We are prophets of a future not our own. Amen."

Use the church Mission and Vision statements in your devotional times. When you've read a passage of scripture and considered it, then prayerfully read the Vision statement or the Mission statement and ask, "What now, God, would you like me to do for your Kingdom?"

2015 Missions Report

Thank you for so generously giving to Missions projects and making this church, by your prayers, participation and giving, a church that reaches well beyond these walls to bring glory to Jesus Christ and his love to many people. The Missions team

anticipates that our church will be recognized as a 3rd mile Rainbow Covenant Church for the 9th year in a row!

The Rainbow Covenant seeks to help churches develop an intentional, well-balanced approach to involvement in missions close to home, in the U.S. and globally. To be recognized as a 3rd mile Rainbow Covenant Church, a church must first fully pay their apportionments AND must fully support projects in every rainbow mission category. Here's summary of what the miles and colors of the Rainbow Covenant mean and how we did in 2015:

First Mile:

To be a first-mile church simply means that apportionments are paid in full at the end of the year. Our appointments of \$32,373 with \$938 in district askings were paid in full for 2015!

Second Mile:

Here's where we get into the colors of the rainbow. Our rainbow has seven colors, each representing a mission category. A

second mile church will give \$6 per member to world hunger (green) and \$1 per member to the other color categories. Here's how our numbers added up by the end of 2015:

In fact, it's your generous giving that allows us to respond when disaster strikes and help families recover, communities rebuild and hope to be stored.



They worked diligently to make the best use of resources while fulfilling their desire for fresh paraments. Perhaps you've noticed the results draping the Table. They worked with the Memorial Committee and have used funds given in memory of Edie Ford, Thelma Hamiel and Esther Witmer. Some General Budget Funds from the Creative Worship Work Area were also applied toward the purchase.

Discipleship Pathway - Scripture Reflection

In January we looked at Prayer and Meditation. This month we will look at Scripture Reflection. Both are related to being "Deeply Rooted" from our church's vision statement.

Recently I've spent some time wondering what Jesus was doing between his birth and his baptism by John. The Bible is pretty quiet about those nearly thirty years. Matthew 2 tells us Joseph took the family to Egypt after the wisemen's warning, and then after Herod's death they moved to Nazareth. Luke 2 has the story about Jesus accidentally being left behind at the temple when he was twelve (parents, breathe a sigh of relief as you note that Mary and Joseph lost their kid once too). Luke also tells us that his parents went to Jerusalem for Passover every year, and Jesus went too when he was old enough, indicating that they were faithful Jews. Luke 2 ends with this sentence: "And Jesus increased in wisdom and in years, and in divine and human favor." So, while we don't know what Jesus was up to all those years, we do know what those years produced: wisdom and favor. Jesus had amazing understanding at a young age (Luke 2:47) and as he grew his wisdom increased. This wisdom is evident in the stories of the Gospels. He knew the Jewish texts and understood what they meant. It's not a stretch, then, to say that one way he gained wisdom is through the study of the scriptures. Likewise, we can gain wisdom through the study of scriptures. Of course Jesus was divine as well as human, so that seems to be an advantage for him. However, because of God's spirit living in us, we too can study scripture and listen to the Holy Spirit to understand. Scripture reflection isn't something just for spiritual elites (whoever they are). Scripture reflection is for everyone regardless of age, intellect, or background.

Suggestions to consider. There are several ways to grow in Scripture Reflection, not limited to these lists: pick up the Bible and start reading one of the Gospels, read the scriptures that are listed daily in The Upper Room, use a Bible app and pick a reading plan based on a topic or one of the books of the Bible, join a GIG or Lenten study for discussion. If you've already been reading scripture, take some steps to increase your reflection to better listen to the Holy Spirit: practice some specific methods (Lectio Divina and SOAPY are outlined in <u>A Disciple's Path</u>), begin to journal, discern how the scripture lesson should affect your actions and then respond.

1ST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH ENDOWMENT FUND

March is the one time/year the Leadership Council considers proposals for the use of income from the 1st UMC Endowment Fund. Please submit any proposals to the church office <u>before</u> March 8!! There are three designated categories from which funds may be requested:

- A. Missions/People projects: local, district, conference, national, international
- B. Maintenance/Trustees: major repairs, major improvements, special objects or furnishings
- C. Ministry/Program Development: education, communication, evangelism, worship...

Guidelines state that income from Endowments may never go toward on-going, budgeted expenses of the church. Furthermore, the founding document states:

The existence of this Endowment Fund must in no way reduce the responsible current support and involvement of the church members.

Proposals may come from groups, committees or individuals, though it's preferred they come from a group or committee.

Field Outreach Ministers of the Iowa Annual Conference

Posted Nov. 30, 2015

Local church leaders gathered on the campus of <u>Morningside College</u> recently to explore how every congregation is uniquely created by God for its mission in the world. Bryan Rose presented the basic principles of a book entitled <u>Church Unique</u>, which is a new resource being utilized with the <u>Healthy</u> <u>Church Initiative</u> (HCI) across the Iowa Conference.

The basic assumption of the book is that "God is up to something both cosmically significant and locally specific" in the lives of each of our churches. It inspires and equips congregations and their leaders to discern, develop, and deliver on a clear, compelling, and shared picture of where God is leading them.

Ryan Christenson, the Field Outreach Minister for the Northwest District, helped to coordinate the training event, which was held on November 16-17. He and his seven colleagues work with local churches to develop partnerships among laity and clergy through processes such as HCI to strengthen our ability to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Field Outreach Ministers serve with a Conference Superintendent and an Administrative Assistant in each of eight districts across the state. The total investment in 2016 related to these district ministry teams is \$3.1 million, which represents about 25% of conference apportionments contributed by the local churches of Iowa. Our Field Outreach Minister is Rev. Jill Sanders. We've been blessed by her guidance in huge and inspiring ways! Our apportionments make her service possible.

Caring Ministries

Through Caring Ministries, you sent out a total of 130+ birthday, anniversary, sympathy and anniversary of loss cards, visited 45-55 people who don't get out and about much at Valentine's Day, Easter, Halloween & Christmas, and offered support through prayer shawls and teddy bears, etc.

As a church, we can always do more to show our support and love for one another. Caring Ministries only supplements what YOU already do. Please continue to reach out, develop relationships and show you care with your friends, neighbors and strangers.

Drake University Wesley Foundation

Nineteen first-year students at Drake University have been exploring faith this fall with Ted Lyddon Hatten, an artist who also serves at the director of the Wesley Foundation there. Guests can learn more about their conversations by viewing Seeing ~ Believing: an exhibition of visual manifestations of belief. The display is now open through December 17th at the Wesley House Gallery, 2718 University, Des Moines, Iowa.

We "have been wrestling with weighty questions about the nature of belief and the limitations of seeing," he explained. "Over the course of the semester, we have looked at the difference between sacred and profane, between sight and blindness, between art and propaganda. We have discovered that some things are easier to believe if they are not seen, while others are impossible to believe unless they are seen."
