Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors




Are you tired of reading, hearing and being encouraged to participate in a GIG or some other small group for Bible Study, prayer and depth? Are you still wondering why we have a "Discipleship Pathway Self-Assessment?" Are you wondering what's the big deal about "discipleship?" Read on, excerpts of an article by Mike Breen, author of over 20 books, his most notable being <u>Building a Discipling Culture</u>.

So what is the engine of the church?

Discipleship.

I've said it many times: If you make disciples, you will always get the church. But if you try to build the church, you will rarely get disciples.



If you're good at making disciples, you'll get more leaders than you know what to do with. If you make disciples in the way Jesus did, you'll see people come to faith who didn't know Him. If you disciple people well, you will always get the missional thing as a byproduct. Always.

The truth about discipleship is that it's never hip and it's never in style... because it's the call to come and die, it's a "long obedience in the same direction", it's fasting in the wilderness and taking up your cross.

[To be the church in mission is...] humbling. There's often no obvious glory in it. It's for the long haul. *And it's completely unsustainable without discipleship.*

Jesus knew what he was doing to form and build his disciples. "While Jesus was going up to Jerusalem, he took the twelve disciples aside by themselves, and said to them..." (Matthew 20:17) "They were on the road, going up to Jerusalem, and Jesus was walking ahead of them; they were amazed, and those who followed were afraid. He took the twelve aside again and began to tell them..." (Mark 10:32)

Being "DEEPLY ROOTED, BRANCHING OUT, and BEARING FRUIT" takes intentionality and work. And it all must be grounded in the deep soil of a relationship with Jesus Christ. That's DISCIPLESHIP!!

After graduating from college I began an 8-year stint teaching Developmental Reading at Alden, Iowa. We rented a farmhouse outside of the little burg of Popejoy. There was a UM church in Popejoy, a 2-mile drive. It was an active, friendly church. I enjoyed it because the guys talked farming during coffee. But after a couple weeks we drove the six miles into Alden to the UMC. It was the same pastor, but many of the teachers attended there, and there were more activities for the women. After a year of being greeted at the door by Mike Petersen saying, "You're late! Sunday school started an hour ago!" we decided to go to the adult Sunday School class. It had 40 to 50 people. After the first year they told me I was the teacher?!

On a weeknight after our <u>first visit</u> to the Alden church, the pastor and a lay person came out to our house. The purpose of their visit was to invite us to give money to pay off the new (perhaps four years old) church building. They saw the end of the mortgage and they were doing a drive to knock it off. We felt it a little strange at the time; and we felt rather poor. We didn't give. Within a month there was a celebratory service that included burning the mortgage. It was followed by a picnic in the city park.

It wasn't long before I felt like I missed out on something. Even a \$10 bill would have given me a satisfactory feeling that I had been part of a significant history. It wasn't as big deal to me then, that I be part of it. Later I entered ministry out of that church, and in fact, another person, from our young family group, was in seminary at the same time. (I know six Iowa UM pastors from that church, including one of my students!) Those people contributed at least \$1,000 to our tuition every year. They knew what it was to be part of something bigger, more long-lasting than themselves! When I consider the spiritual legacy upon which I stand, the Alden-Popejoy UMCs are firmly under me. And I am privileged to be part of their legacy.

Neighbors & Disciples

John: The Gospel of Light and Life

For the Easter season, beginning the week after Easter, we will be offering a new study on the Gospel of John using curriculum from Adam Hamilton. Hamilton is gifted at producing content that helps both novice and experienced Bible readers gain new understanding. The 6-week curriculum includes a book with the text of John included, and a video and discussion guide for GIGs (Growth and Impact Groups). Please, if you've never read the Bible, haven't read it lately, or have read it but found it to be difficult to grasp, don't miss this opportunity! Our GIGs are a safe place to learn and grow. If you're not already in a GIG, contact the church office or Melinda Stonebraker to be connected.

Discipleship Pathway - Corporate Worship

The past two months we've looked at the "Deeply Rooted" part of our discipleship pathway self-assessment. The "Deeply Rooted" section can be thought of as the individual-focused interactions with God through Scripture and Prayer. Now we move on to the "Branching Out" section, which can be thought of as the interactions that occur in the church to connect us more deeply to God.

The first category in "Branching Out" is Corporate Worship. For many, corporate, or large group, worship was their introduction to the life of the church. When people say they're "going to church" they usually mean they're going to "corporate worship." Many people have busy work and family schedules that cause us to miss worship with our local church community. When that happens, I hope we do actually *miss* it. Worshipping as a group is an important part of our faith. We are interconnected by

our presence at worship; we support one another just by being present. In <u>A Disciple's Path</u> James Harnish says,

"There are times when I come to worship to affirm the faith that I hold, but there are other times when I come to worship so that the faith the church affirms can hold me. There are times when I come to sing my song of hope, but there are times when I need the church to sing that song for me."

He's a pastor and even he indicates there are some times when he doesn't "feel" like going to worship. American culture, sometimes including the church, is consumer-driven. We are tempted to only do the things that make us happy and comfortable. As disciples of Jesus we need to be careful to avoid looking at church as a place where we go just to be comfortable: to get our worship music in a certain style, to hear a certain length sermon, to get a certain feeling, etc. Those preferences can be important, but they're *preferences*, and worshipping God together should not be about preferences. It should be about God: the Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer of our faith.

To grow in your practice of corporate worship, consider the following: make worship attendance a priority in your life; come to worship early or stay late to connect with other people; stay mentally and spiritually engaged during worship by listening, participating, thinking, taking notes to consider later, etc; volunteer to serve during worship: children's lesson, reading scripture, nursery, usher, greeter, etc; practice listening and being aware of God's presence at worship.

First United Methodist Church ENDOWMENT FUND

1st UMC has a modest Endowment Fund, from which interest income is received annually. 2015 income amounted to \$717.94. That income is divided three ways:

- 30% Missions: people projects, local to international:
- 30% Maintenance: repairs, major improvements, special objects or furnishings;
- 40% Ministries: enhancements, education, communication, evangelism, worship

The purpose of the Endowment is:

For charitable purposes of the church with its prime objectives being the promotion and development of religious, charitable and educational activities; and for non-recurring purposes NOT REGULARLY BUDGETED. (The caps are in the original document!)

It is preferred that requests come from a work area or committee of the church, but requests from individuals are also received and valued. The date of the March Leadership Council meeting is the 9th. After that date the next access to Endowment Funds is March 2017. Submit your requests, in writing, to Kathy Houstman, the pastor or the church office before midnight March 8!

Based on the numbers above, I trust you can each determine some conclusions. I will just say there are two lines that are central to me. One is the "Ave. worship attendance." That number says something about each of our commitments to God, to one another, and to caring for one another. A basic tenet of the Christian faith is that the Holy Spirit works in us and through us to encourage one another. If we're not present, we're not fulfilling the intention of Christ

The other line, historically, is the "S.S. average attendance." We trended up the seven years from 2006 to 2012. Since then we are trending down. While this number is more than just children, I do invite every family with children to consider what we teach [or fail to teach!] our children by not putting a value on the discipline of regular Sunday School attendance. I'd be remiss if I didn't give a statement of gratitude and praise to the teachers who every week prepare a lesson and are here to model and teach the faith if even one child comes.

I anticipate in the future using a third line to give, as much as is possible, objective measure of our discipleship. That line will be the number of people involved in settings of intentional discipleship. Currently there are about 54 people participating in GIGs. (Growth & Impact Groups) Is it crazy to think that could double in the next two years?? (Why not?!)


"MEMBERS"

CONNECTIONS MATTER

ACEs is an acronym, short for Adverse Childhood Experiences. "ACEs" wasn't around when you and I were "kids." Oh sure, that does not mean we didn't have such things as separated parents, death of close relatives or even parents, and we did have substance abuse and various forms of child abuse. But we might have figured that's just the way it was.

We are wiser now! Brain studies can show us that ACEs actually affect the development of a child's brain. When children experience ACEs, it's possible that their brain synopses are changed; they go from experiencing a world of "good" to a world of turbulence.

To counter-balance ACEs, children need supportive, encouraging, nonjudgmental adults in their lives. That's what this workshop is intended to encourage and foster among the adults and children of this church. YOU can be part of the "Core Protective System" of a child, to provide inoculation for threats and adversities that are sure to be part of life.

We will hear that children need positive affirmations. They need a developed sense of attachment and belonging. And they need a community culture of healthy spirituality. Yup, they should be getting an intentional dose of every one of those things from the adults in this church!

EVERY ADULT is invited to this workshop!! Make Easter a reality in the relationships of this church!

The Leadership Council determined it wise to seek funds with which to keep moving the church forward. To do that, they are utilizing the Edie Ford Bequest funds as a base for the "Leaving a Legacy" campaign. If you are like me, one of the first questions that arises is: WHY? This note will seek to give you a response.

- 1. We need to give the families and individuals of the church today an opportunity to "put their mark" on the ministries of the church. We can create the stories for future generations to share with their children's children. It's exciting to hear of the work people did when the Education Wing was built; when the organ was put in; when the "old parsonage" was moved. WE can have stories of what God did when WE were young adults with young families!!
- 2. We are seeking to be faithful to the "Prescriptions" which were noted on the Healthy Church Initiative (HCI) Consultation Report. One of the things suggested was to have a "Welcome Center," a location where people of the church and those new could go for information and/or signing up. We do not have space in the Worship Center for such activity. We have plans inhand for such a "Welcome Center;" and even have people in the church willing to put it together.
- 3. You know we live in a digital culture, even as many of our people are used to a print culture. A screen is being installed in the Gathering Place we can use to display information, convey worship services to those who have needed to leave for any reason, and to project educational, spiritual and inspirational materials.
- 4. We're not "done" with the building. You know very well that we've made changes and adjustments to the church building to make it as useable as possible for a variety of ministries. There's more. For a year now the Trustees have sought advice and estimates of what it will cost to renew the main tower steps. (We have confidence they won't fall down any time soon. They're safe!) So far, they have determined that the one solid bid of \$28,000 is not compatible with the church's mission and are seeking other ideas and estimates for the necessary work.
- 5. The breezeway was installed 51 years ago to connect the main, original building with the then-new Education Wing. The steel doors and round door knobs are unfriendly to children. Many preschoolers are not able to open the doors themselves. (That's not to mention the door that doesn't even work any more; and an "emergency exit" door that is impossible to open at certain times of the year!) People with mobility issues have as much or more concern to get into the

building. Two estimates

came in around \$20,000 to redo the breezeway and Education Wing doors, including some sort of accessible door.

6. Every year for my 10 years here, the SPRC and Trustees have faithfully conducted a tour of the parsonage. Every year of those 10, the list of needs included "update the bathrooms; update the kitchen". Because of the great needs of the 607 Lynn Street property, we have put off the house work. The Trustees are now getting [sticker shock!] estimates on the costs involved for the work on the house.

The Trustees are already making plans to put their share of the original Edie Ford Bequest to good use. Furthermore, at their January 27 meeting, the Leadership Council approved two expenditures of the 15% of "ministry funds" from that bequest. One proposal, of \$1,500, was to cover the purchase and installation of the technology in the Gathering Place. The other, also approved, was to go ahead with the construction of a portable (wheeled) "counter" that could serve as a "Welcome Center."

Soon the Children's Sunday School teachers and others involved with children's ministries will begin to dream about the possibilities.

The plan approved at the 2015 Church Conference and affirmed by the Leadership Council is thus:

- A. Starting with the Edie Ford Bequest of \$31,227, build Leaving A Legacy to \$100,000
- B. 50% of the funds toward Trustee projects
- C. 25% of the funds into the 1st UMC-Tipton Endowment Fund
- D. 15% of the funds toward ministries, especially new, emerging ministries and those addressing the HCI Consultation Rx's.
- E. 10% of the funds toward "Children's Ministries"
- F. {This has not been stated, but has been implicit.} Funds are not to replace or relieve those ministries historically supported by the General Budget or Children's Ministry resources.
