Their daughter Callie will be entering her third year of college, and their oldest son Andy and his wife Stephanie live nearby. She has gifts and a passion for children, youth, families, and outreach ministry, having led numerous youth and adult mission trips over the years. When not doing ministry in the local church, Pastor Jenny enjoys time with family hiking, kayaking, gardening, and traveling.

Please be in prayer for Pastor Jenny and her family as they transition to ministry in Tipton. Her first Sunday will be July 3. Open your heart and decide that you are going to love Pastor Jenny. Send cards of welcome and encouragement to Pastor Jenny Seylar; 10 Chad Ct.; Coralville, IA 52241.

Jane and I will be loading our things June 24th. At that point I will no longer be your pastor. You are released of this pastor-parishioner



relationship to have ability to put your whole self into ministry with Pastor Jenny. Until July 1 there will be on-call pastors, and Pastor Jenny Seylar will begin as your pastor July 1. Spencer is a long way away, but even if it was next door, I will not return to perform pastoral duties. That's just standard ethical practice of ministerial professionals. Beyond that, can you imagine how 'popular' a former pastor would become if there was the appearance of picking and choosing who he or she would/would not return to extend favors?!?! That would quickly get very muddy.

As your pastor I have sought to be faithful to one guiding principle: What must we do to be faithful to the gospel of Jesus Christ? I have not always presented Jesus with sensitivity, and sometimes I've failed to communicate clearly the theological and/or biblical "why". It's no secret to most of you that I can be impatient. I ask for forgiveness. Don't hold my failings against one another, current or future. In spite of our humanness, I believe we have headed a direction pleasing to God. It will be exciting to see what God and you will do next!!

Oh, and one more thing, if I may be so bold: Don't 'use' social media to communicate any message that should be delivered directly. And don't think that just because something is 'out there' that "everyone knows."

O God, our help in ages past, our hope for years to come, our shelter from the stormy blast, and our eternal home!

(<u>UM Hymnal</u> No. 117; vs. 1)

In 1947 & 48 there was a massive remodeling of the then-44 year-old building. The congregation did major work on what is now called the Gathering Place. When that work was done, they worshipped in that space for a time while the sanctuary underwent major remodeling. Can you imagine?!?! It was only 44 years old! On November 21, 1948 they held a major re-dedication Service. On page three of the re-dedication program is this note:

Briefly, Methodism in Tipton began in 1841 with a small Methodist Class of five people. Today we are more than six-hundred-fifty strong.

Using that record, it means Tipton 1st United Methodist Church has given witness for **175 years**!! That long and faithful history of being God's church provides much cause for humility for Jane and I as we close out 11 years of ministry with you in Cedar County and Tipton. Little did any of us know 11 years ago what sort of water God would bring us through.

For example, I had no concept that I would ever lead a church in doing anything more than routine maintenance with a church facility. After going from the top of the peak with the new roof to the dirt beneath the basement floor, I realize anew that God can use us in surprising ways! I've never had a dream {maybe a nightmare or two!} about raising funds for capital improvements. But being part of the miraculous ways God moved among us in the midst of the biggest economic down-turn in most of our lives so we could be a debt-free center for missions and ministries made me realize how much fun it must be for God to sit up in heaven, big stogie between his fingers, saying, "I love it when a plan comes together!" And WE get to be part of that joy! Wow.

But as exciting as those tangible activities have been, there is another, more gratifying aspect of ministry, to which I feel much more strongly called. Ministry is people. Specifically, calling people to move further into the work and joy of intentional discipleship. "Ministry" is not dropping everything to do whatever people want us to do. (That's either slavery; or a diseased need to be a people-pleaser!!) "People ministry" is harder to quantify, but may include:

66 Baptisms;

159 people received into membership (six have died; at least 23 of the adults have since moved away);

40 marriages;

115 funerals; including 80 "members" who have died;

55,392 is the number of miles I have vouchered for reimbursement;

129 monthly "programs" at Prairie Hills (and probably half that number at Cedar Manor).

Yes, we came into Tipton just 10 days prior to the first residents moving to Prairie Hills. The second time I visited Esther Witmer, she suggested that "the church needs to do some programs out here." That was the start, and since October of 2005 there has been a "program" by area churches/pastors nearly every Tuesday at 2 pm.

We've been speaking of "legacies." Few are as strong as that of Esther. My first week then-secretary Sylvia Gould said I should really go ask Esther if, at 96 years old, she was still willing to schedule the worship readers. Well, I thought that sounded like a good idea so I went to her house, just prior to her move to Prairie Hills. She said, "Well, if you want me to I suppose I could still do that. With email it's really not all that difficult." Well, that comment, looking back, was like God saying:

"Behold, I do a new thing; Get on board... or get run over!"

Thanks, Esther. Thanks, God. I'm proud to be a footnote in your history.

I am excited that you get to have Jenny Seylar as your next pastor. She brings delightful gifts for ministry and a passion to continue to help you move deeper and more faithfully into the life of discipleship. Pray for her until she begins her ministry here on July 1; then pray for her <u>because</u> she's your pastor!

Worship Speaker June 5

Mike Herring will be present with us Sunday, June 5 during worship (9:30am) to present the work that God is doing in Liberia. He suggests reading this brief history and included these comments: In general, Liberians' are very grateful for what the United States has done and continues to do for their country. In order to understand why the Ebola crisis of 2013-2015 was so devastating to the country, one has to know the history of the country. What I tried to do in this one page synopsis is to describe why the once former 'bread basket' and 'economic center' of sub -Saharan Africa cannot even feed her own people. The people of Liberia need our help!

Liberia was officially recognized by the world community as an independent county on July 26, 1847, when the Liberian founders signed their Declaration of Independence from the United States of America. The signing of this document was the result a prearranged agreement that began 27 years earlier, when freed slaves from northern states of the USA, i.e. the Union, aided by The American Colonization Society were given passage to Africa; the purpose being to establish the country now known as Liberia.

The first group of 86 freed slaves departed New York City on February 6, 1820, on their epic journey to Africa. Upon their arrival, in what is now the capital city Monrovia, many perished as a result of malaria and typhoid. Over the next 27 years, additional ships made the trans-Atlantic voyage, bringing a total of approximately 3,800 freed slaves to their new home. Collectively, these "pilgrims" were/are referred to as Americo-Liberians.

It must be noted the area the Americo-Liberians settled was already populated by an indigenous population, consisting of 16 tribal organizations. The tribal boundaries were and are generally defined by rivers, forming the outline of 15 distinct county entities. Because of their educational background and the fact they came from the United States, a country already reaching world economic dominance, the Americo-Liberian politicians considered themselves to be of an elite class. For the next century, the Americo-Liberian politicians governed in an elite-sub servant manner, causing continuous friction between the two "classes".

In the 1943 the Liberian people elected William Tubman, grandson of Harriet Tubman (founder of the U.S. Underground Railroad system) as their President. President Tubman made it a point to position indigenous people within his administration. That appeased the indigenous population to a minor extent, but created animosity within the Americo-Liberian ruling class. Upon President Tubman's death, his Vice President, William Tolbert assumed the office of Presidency. During his Presidential tenure, cut short by his assassination, President Tolbert divested the Tubman indigenous appointees of their leadership positions. President Tolbert was replaced by an indigenous rebel leader named Samuel Doe, who governed the country under 'military styled junta rule' for the next five years. In 1985 Samuel Doe was elected President, under scandalous voter fraud circumstances, which plagued his administration until his execution style assassination five years later. During President Doe's rule, foreign leaders, including the US, began backing another rebel leader named Charles Taylor. After President Doe's assassination, Charles Taylor assumed control of Liberia. Taylor's Presidency did not improve the troubled nation's political tensions and in fact propelled the country into a 13 year civil war.

Because of political skirmishes, that began in the mid 1980's, Liberia's 'agricultural reputation' of once being considered the "Bread Basket" of sub-Saharan Africa ceased to exist!!! Today, 90% of Liberian's food is imported from foreign countries. Also of note is the fact 80% of a typical Liberian's diet comes from rice. The country of Liberia has yet to recover economically from it 13 year civil war. The country is presently saddled with a 90% unemployment rate, with the average **WORKING** Liberian earning \$3.00 to \$3.50 per **D**AY.

When Ebola struck the country in early 2014, the country was already set up for failure as identified by the statistics referenced above. In an effort to contain the spread of Ebola, the country's borders were closed. While this aided in the containment of the Ebola virus, it also meant food imports were stopped at the border. Food that was allowed into the country became a precious "black market" commodity, driving up food costs to an already desperately poor country. Thus, the need for our November 2014 fund raiser.

Renovations of the kitchen/dining room and most recently, the Gathering Place have helped our church to be more welcoming. (Pull up a chair next to the fireplace and take a deep breath. That's a new favorite spot for me in Tipton in addition to our back porch!) It's a never ending process. You're headed in the right direction; keep working at it!

Vacation Bible School is right round the corner and the planning committee has been hard at work!



Blessed to be on this Journey with You

I'm overwhelmed with the love, kindness, and support that our congregation has shown to me since we announced that I'm pursuing a call to ordained ministry. Several people have asked for more specifics, so I want to share that information with all of you. Ryan, Zoe, Lea, and I all appreciate your prayers.

I start at University of Dubuque Theological Seminary this summer, with online orientation starting mid-June and preparatory assignments beginning in early July. I will then go to campus July 30-August 12 for the first August "intensive". After the intensive there will be a few more assignments to finish the summer session. Then Fall semester starts in early September and ends in December. Spring semester starts late January and ends early May. There is a second two-week intensive at the beginning of January each year. During the regular Fall and Spring semesters, I will go to campus on Mondays only, with the remainder of my work being done online. The program lasts 4-years and is part-time, with 10-11 credits per semester, some of which are done during the intensives. At the end of it all, I should receive a Master of Divinity degree. I'll be taking classes in the areas of Bible, Church History, Theology, and Ministry (disciple making, caregiving, leading worship, preaching). There will also be some field experiences (done in Tipton?) and a set of Integrative courses including God's Redemptive Mission, Gospel in Context, Starting Missional Communities, and Discipleship Formation. I'll also have electives, some of which will be United Methodist studies.

At the same time that I'm going to seminary, I'm also working through the process of candidacy for ordination in the United Methodist Church. It's a rather lengthy process. The first step includes study, self-reflection, working with a mentor (Alexis Johnson from West Branch UMC is my mentor), meetings with the district committee on ministry, and more with the end goal of being a certified candidate. My current plan, which is subject to change, is to be certified as candidate later this year.

Many of you have asked how you can help. Please pray for us; share in our joys and our concerns. This is a new endeavor for our family and one that has surprised us. We are apprehensive even as we are excited and we certainly appreciate your prayers on our behalf. In addition, during the intensives when I'm away, Ryan and the girls might like some food and company (the girls especially may like some company). It's suggested that I order most of my books through Amazon, so if you have any Amazon store credit you don't plan to use and want to give to us, let me know. Additionally, if you hear of scholarships that you think I'd qualify for, please tell me.

Discipleship Pathway Self-Assessment

Back in cold January we started looking deeper each month at one of the elements in our discipleship pathway self-assessment. We started with Deeply Rooted: scripture reflection, prayer and meditation; and then moved to Branching Out: corporate worship and small group study, and are now ready to begin Branching Out.

The first element in Branching Out is "Gifts-based Service". 1 Peter 4:10 (CEB) says, "serve each other according to the gift each person has received, as good managers of God's diverse gifts". Often an introduction to gifts-based service is volunteering in the church. However, volunteering isn't the same as serving in your area of spiritual giftedness. Spiritual gifts are not necessarily aligned with our talents or skills, the areas where we most naturally volunteer. Spiritual gifts "are the grace of God at work within us, empowering us to match our deep passions with the world's deep need. The gifts are given to individuals, but they are given to build and strengthen community and to meet the needs of those around us" (umc.org). Spiritual gifts include teaching, hospitality, prayer, healing, prophecy, helping, administration, and more.

To learn more about what gift(s) you've been given by the Holy Spirit (EVERY believer has a gift, including YOU), take an assessment at <u>umc.org/what-we-believe/spiritual-gifts</u>. Then, after you know your gift(s), or if you already know, but aren't using your gift(s), talk to your GIG leader, Melinda Stonebraker, or Pastor Paul about how you can use your gift(s) in our community.

Gifts-based service is so important to being a fruitful and fulfilled disciple of Jesus that it should not be overlooked. Jesus says in John 15, "My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.... I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete." Prayerfully consider how you are participating in gift-based service "that your joy may be complete".

WORKING TOGETHER TO FULFILL GOD'S MISSION

The United Methodist Church in <u>Mount Ayr</u> has seen tremendous growth in the last few years. Seventy people in worship was the norm only seven years ago. Now, however, their attendance is regularly 120.

The small congregation in rural southern Iowa was founded in 1856. When several of their leaders began participating in <u>Healthy Church Initiative</u> (HCI) workshops, exciting things began to happen.

Our laity began to dream dreams and recognize that "all things are possible in Christ," said their pastor, the Rev. Charles "Skip" Rushing.

During a weekend consultation, the second step of the HCI process, the church explored their hopes for future. A team of consultants presented a report to the congregation after talking with church leaders, which included "prescriptions," or action steps, that they could pursue in response to the gifts that God had already given them for ministry.

A Wednesday after-school program has developed as a result of their engagement with HCI, and their youth group is growing. "It's allowing people to have energy and a positive feeling about what can happen," said Rushing. Their mission support has improved, and they are more intentionally nurturing relationships in the community, including the school.

HCI is supported in part with \$30,000 in Parish Development funds made possible through the apportionment gifts of the United Methodist churches of Iowa.
